

THE WAT A GLANCE

- **+ 77%** of W graduates are still working in the state **three years** after graduation.
- The W leads IHL with the highest number of Mississippians enrolled at 86%, compared to the IHL System average of 63%.
- W students graduate with the least amount of debt among Southern regional universities.

THE W SUPPORTS MISSISSIPPI

The university's economic value to the state totaled more than **\$215 million** during fiscal year 2021-22. Expressed in terms of jobs, The W's impact supported **3,433 jobs**.

FINANCIAL SUSTAINABILITY

Under the expert leadership of President Miller, The W holds **no debt**, has appropriate cash reserves, has access to a growing endowment of over **\$61 million** in assets and awarded more than **\$2 million** in scholarships. The university has several recently completed major improvement projects. The W takes pride in our thoughtful stewardship of the funding appropriated by our legislators.

INCREASED APPLICATIONS

The university has seen a **22% increase** in applications and a **28% increase** in students who have been admitted and have confirmed their intent to enroll for this fall, compared to this point last year. The increase in prospects for this same time is **up 58%** over last year due to the increased number of names from ACT.

AFFORDABLE & ACCESSIBLE

When it comes to affordable degrees, The W is **leading the state**. Washington Monthly's 2023 Best Bang for the Buck Rankings: South ranked the university **No. 15** nationally. In 2023, The W ranked **No. 1** for Least Debt among Regional Universities (South) and tied for **No. 5** in Top Performers on Social Mobility among public southern regional universities, according to U.S. News & World Report.
